- General characteristics
Students are primarily from an English speaking background, with approximately 20% of students currently on Schoolcard, four Aboriginal students.

: Specialised programs to meet the needs of students with disabilities, special needs
- Student management
Consistent student behaviour management procedures are used across the school, based around 'Restorative Justice' practices. Values education underpins all behaviour strategies established by staff, students and wider school community.
- Student government
: There are 2 Student captains appointed from the Upper Primary who help lead the SRC.
: Each class has a regular meeting to discuss a range of issues and make recommendations to the elected Student Representative Council (SRC). The SRC is also involved in coordinating fundraising activities. The SRC communicates decisions to the Principal, staff and Governing Council for consideration.
- Special programmes
: We have a very proactive and self-motivated Student Mentor programme.
: A number of parents are used to support classroom based programs (eg reading).

- Students being encouraged to take risks and accept greater responsibility for their own learning.

- Recent key outcomes:

4. Curriculum

- Subject offerings: All areas, with an emphasis on whole school programs to support literacy and numeracy development in all learners.
- Open Access/Distance Education provision: Yes – Japanese language is offered through open access
- Special needs: Student with additional needs receive allocated funding used to employ classroom SSOs to work one-on-one with identified students.
- Special curriculum features: Students in Years 4 to 7 are screened to determine if they require additional support within the QuickSmart Numeracy program offered at the school.
- Teaching methodology: Teachers use current, best practice teaching methodologies based on research and promoted through the Department for Education. The framework used is the Teaching for Effective Learning (TfEL

framework). Staff use the Australian Curriculum to inform the teaching and learning which occurs within their class.

- Student assessment procedures and reporting: Parent/teacher interviews are held in Terms 1 and 3. Mid-year reports are distributed to families in Week 10 of Term 2. End-of-year reports are distributed to families in Week 9 of Term 4.

5. Sporting Activities

- All sport is community based, competing against towns across Yorke Peninsula. The school encourages participation in S.A.P.S.A.S.A. activities through the Northern Yorke Peninsula District. Participates in NYPPSASA (Northern Yorke Peninsula Primary Schools Amateur Sports Association) Sports Day; Premier's Be Active Challenge; Swimming and Aquatics.

6. Other Co-Curricular Activities

- Student in the Upper Primary class attend weekly leadership sessions. Upper Primary students also have the option of participating in the Young Environmental Leaders program with students from other schools across the NYP Partnership.
- All students participate in Dancify lessons which culminates in a whole school production held at the end of Term 2.

9. School Facilities

- Buildings and grounds

The school has been upgraded through the BER Project. We have a COLA that has a full sized netball court and Basketball court. The school consists of three

main buildings, comprising a prefabricated, acoustically upgraded triple classroom, a transportable classroom and an upgraded Library/Administration area. All teaching areas are carpeted and air conditioned/heated. The school is situated on large, attractive grounds. Students have access to small grassed area, amphitheatre, large paved basketball/netball court and adjoining town oval and facilities.

: Two privately contracted buses service the school, covering an area of up to 24 kilometres in diameter. The Bute Bus company has a range of buses available for hire and use on excursions.

: Bute and District Kindergarten relocated onto the school site during 2001. In 2018, the 2 sites have officially amalgamated.

10. School Operations

- Decision making structures

: Decision making is a shared responsibility between staff, parents and students, facilitated through parent body and staff meetings. Parent bodies include the Governing Council and related sub-committees and the Parent Club.

- Regular publications

:Fortnightly newsletter; Parent information booklet produced annually; Daily notices; Staff role statements (annual); Principal's report to Governing Council (monthly); Annual report.

: The school is in a sound financial position and is able to support staff with the structuring of sizeable budget lines across all areas of the curriculum. A 5% reserve of our Resource Entitlement is maintained at all times.

11. Local Community

- General characteristics

Contextual Influences

Established in 1886, Bute is a small R-7 school, situated in an established rural community on Northern Yorke Peninsula. The school is well placed in terms of facilities and resources.

The school population [of approximately 65] derives from a diverse range of socio-economic backgrounds and influences. Students live either in Bute or come from outlying rural properties and homes via one of two school bus services.

The school and its community are impacted by

- Changing rural economics and rationalisation
- Depressed local business activity
- A strong and proud tradition of local identity, allegiance and independence
- Relatively stable enrolment patterns, enhanced by healthy enrolments in the Pre-school

- Consistent staff targets supported by local management and governance.
- Secondary education and regional shopping services being provided at Kadina [30 kms from Bute]

The school and Kindergarten integrates some services where deemed appropriate. The school's core business of teaching and learning, and maintaining and developing educational standards, is underpinned by skilling in the Essential Learnings and targeted areas across the curriculum.

The school strives for continuous improvement in service and performance, whilst being accountable, responsive, innovative and competitive in order to raise standards. A high level of monitoring and reporting of children's development and achievement supports this process. The collection of baseline data is considered important. Staff cater for a variety of learning styles and implement programs, which address student achievement data.

There is strong parent interest in, and support of all aspects of school life at Bute.

- Parent and community involvement
 - : A general interest in the school's affairs is shown at all times, with parents and community members helping when and where required. Involvement in the Parent Bodies is sound, despite membership not being large.
- Feeder or destination schools
 - : Students generally transition into reception from the School-Based Preschool.
 - : Year 7 students generally transition to either Kadina Memorial School or Port Broughton Area School
- Other local care and educational facilities
 - : Bute and District Kindergarten and Rural Care
- Commercial/industrial and shopping facilities
 - : Local supermarket available; Cafe; Garage; Engineering firm; Agricultural supply company; Rural Transaction centre: Major shopping areas located in Kadina
- Other local facilities
 - : Sporting club provides a range of sporting opportunities; Beach facilities available (Approx. 30mins away) at Wallaroo, Moonta and Port Broughton; Variety of recreational facilities available in Kadina including gymnasium; Doctor attends Bute clinic once a week.
